What is Cub Scouting?

- The grade school program of Boy Scouts for boys age 7-10 (grades 1-5)
- A program designed to promote:
 - Character building
 - Citizenship
 - Training in basic skills
 - Physical fitness
 - **FUN!!**

The Cub Scout Program was started in 1930 for boys that wanted to be a part of Scouting but were too young to be Boy Scouts. Currently there are over 1½ million Cub Scouts registered across the country. This year we celebrate the 77th Anniversary of Cub Scouting

What is Cub Scouting?

- Program of activities that provides discovery and learning in an environment of group interaction and teamwork
- Promotes advancement toward achievements
- Program is geared to age level
- Program always includes elements of:

- Fitness

-- Outdoors/nature

Citizenship

-- Safety

Basic life skills

-- Crafts

Dens

- Small groups of 6-8 boys
- Boys grouped by age/rank
- Led by volunteer parent leader and assistant
- Meet weekly (except pack meeting week)
- The foundation of the Cub's experience

Boys will meet once a week.

Usually in a home (or some other place) after school or early evening. The meeting is conducted by the Den Leader and Assistant Den Leader who are parents of the boys in that den.

Family involvement is an integral part of the program for the boy to get the most out of Scouting.

Dens are made up of no more than 8 boys. Den meetings are a time for fun and learning.

They are planned by the leaders using Program Helps supplied by the Boy Scouts of America.

Games, crafts, songs, activities, and badge work can all be a part of the den meeting. However, one of the most important functions of the meeting is to plan for the Pack meeting.

Once a month all the dens get together in the evening for a Pack meeting.

1st grade boys will work in the Tiger Book

3rd grade boys will work in the Bear Book

4th and 5th grade boys will work out of the Webelos Book. Webelos usually meet in the evening and will be preparing to become Boy Scouts.


Although some advancement projects for the Wolf and Bear badges may be started in the Den meetings, boys are expected to do the work at home. Remember, this is a "Home Centered Program"


Parental Involvement

- Parental involvement is necessary for Cub's success
- Pack/dens need parents to thrive
- Organization requires at least two adults at all activities

Leadership for the Pack is supplied by parents in the Pack.

For every eight boys that want to join, there must be a Den Leader and an Assistant Den leader to share the work.

All other parents should help with the Pack Committee.



Our sons will be assigned to Dens. Each of these Dens must have a Den Leader and an Assistant Den Leader. These leaders are all volunteers, as are the people who administer the Pack your son will belong to.

This year is your chance to enter into something very special with your son. We need YOU to volunteer to become a leader. Yes, this will require time and effort on your part to make a good healthy program for our sons. But, can you think of a better way to invest your effort that with your child?



To help you in this endeavor, the Boy Scouts of America offers training, literature, and a network of involved parents to answer questions, open doors, and find solutions. You will not be on your own as a leader.
